Prince of Songkla Regulations for University Undergraduate Studies and Lifelong Education, 2563 B.E.

Whereas it is deemed appropriate to issue Prince of Songkla University Regulations on Undergraduate Studies and Lifelong Education, 2563 B.E.,

By virtue of Article 23 (2) of the Prince of Songkla University Act, 2559 B.E. (2016 C. E.), the University Council of Prince of Songkla University, at its 415th (5/2020) meeting on 18th July, 2020, approved the following stipulations:

Number 1 These Regulations shall henceforth be known as “Prince of Songkla University Regulations for Undergraduate Studies and Lifelong Education, 2563 B.E. (2020 C.E.)”.

Number 2 These Regulations shall be applied to all students and learners enrolled in Prince of Songkla University from the academic year 2020 on.

Number 3 In these Regulations:

“The University” means Prince of Songkla University.

“The President” means President of Prince of Songkla University.

“The Faculty” means faculties, colleges, or other units called otherwise, which are equivalent to the faculties or colleges which offer an undergraduate program.

“The Faculty Board” means boards of faculties, colleges, or other units called otherwise, which are equivalent to the faculties or colleges with which students are affiliated.

“Cumulative Credit” means credits which students or learners must earn to complete as stipulated in a study program.

“Credit Bank” means a system for accumulated credits for learners taking courses or short courses offered at the University, and shall include transferred credits in the Credit Bank system.

“Other higher institutions” means public or private institutions of higher education with quality and standards legally established in Thailand or other countries, or by international organizations.

“Student” means a person with at least a high school diploma or an equivalent level who is enrolled in Prince of Songkla University, including those who are undergoing accreditation of qualifications or accreditation of other qualifications pursuant to the announcement of the programs.

“Learner” means those taking courses or short courses as stipulated by the University.

Number 4 The President is authorized to supervise the execution of these Regulations, and in case of any issues or doubts about these Regulations, or in case of the need for an exemption from these Regulations, the President shall have the authority to scrutinize such issues, and the President’s decision shall be considered authoritative and final.

Section 1 Student Admission

Number 5 Admission to the University’s undergraduate programs may be conducted as follows:

- (1) The Thai University Central Admission System, as conducted by government organizations or agencies.
- (2) Admission as stipulated by the University.
- (3) Admission in accordance with a memorandum of understanding between institutions or an agreement of the cooperation network between institutions or governments.
- (4) Other methods as stipulated by the University Council.

Number 6 Admission shall be in accordance with the University Announcements.

Number 7 University students must possess qualifications as follows:

- (a.) Students
 - (1) Having graduated from at least high school or an equivalent level.
 - (2) Having been admitted as students, as stipulated in Number 5.
- (b.) Learners
 - (1) Studying in or having completed a basic education level, having interest and ability to take courses offered by the University, or those enrolled in an informal education system.
 - (2) Having been admitted to be learners as stipulated in Number 6.

Number 8 Those who are eligible to be students must register for their entry to the University according to the criteria and schedules stipulated in the University Announcement, and failure to do so shall be considered forfeiture of rights.

Learners must register for their entry to the University according to the University Announcement.

Section 2

Academic Administration System

Number 9 The University provides education systems as follows:

(1) Formal education is study with defined aims, educational methods, curriculum, study period, evaluation, and assessments which are graduation requirements.

(2) Non-formal education is study which has flexibility in setting goals, formats, methods of education management, study period, evaluation and measurement tools which are graduation requirements. The content and curriculum shall be appropriate to, and in line with the problems and needs of, each individual group.

(3) Informal education is study in which learners study autonomously based on their interest, potential, readiness, and opportunity, by studying from persons, experience, society, environment, media, or other knowledge resources.

The number of credits and learning period for each course/module shall be in accordance with the University Announcements.

Number 10 The University shall facilitate education through academic collaboration between faculties and programs, and the University shall provide facilitation of education from faculties or programs to students and learners.

Number 11 The University provides academic administration systems as follows.

(1) The bi-semester system is a system in which one academic year is divided into two regular semesters, the first semester and the second semester, which are compulsory. Each regular semester consists of not less than 15 weeks, and there may also be an additional summer semester which is not compulsory, and is made up of not less than 7 weeks, with the number of study hours for each course equaling those of a regular semester.

(2) The education unit system is a system which manages the teaching and learning period according to the study topics, with the number of study hours and the number of credits equaling the criteria of the bi-semester system.

(3) Other systems, e.g., the tri-semester system or the quarter-semester system, are systems in which the number of study hours for each course equals those of a regular semester in the bi-semester system.

Number 12 The volume of academic work for each course shall be considered for credit in accordance with teaching and learning management as follows:

(1) Theory-based part: lectures, problem discussions, and other learning activities which are in line with the philosophy of the University, totaling at least 15 hours over one regular semester, shall be counted as one credit.

(2) Practice-based part: projects, special problems, experiments or practice in order to develop skills, analytical thinking, or problem solving in real situations totaling 30-45 hours over one regular semester shall be counted as one credit.

(3) Training, field work, or Work Integrated Learning (WIL) teaching and learning activities totaling 45-90 hours over one regular semester shall be counted as one credit.

(4) Cooperative education is learning that occurs in the workplace continuously for not less than 16 weeks, and not less than 6 credits. Students shall pass a preparatory course in cooperative education taking not less than 30 hours.

(5) For courses with unique characteristics, the University may assign a number of credits based on other appropriate criteria.

Number 13 The Faculty responsible for courses may assign the requirements for certain courses so that students are able to learn those courses efficiently.

Any invalid course registration shall be void.

Number 14 Course enrollment in each semester is to be conducted according to the criteria, methods, and schedules stipulated in the University Announcement as follows:

(1) Course enrollment shall be completed within the first week after the opening date of a regular semester or within the first two days of a summer semester.

(2) Students who are not able to enroll within the period stipulated in (1) may request for late registration within 30 days after the opening date of a regular semester or two weeks after the opening date of a summer semester, and are subject to pay for the late registration fine at the rate stipulated in the University Announcement.

(3) In any regular semester, if students fail to enroll, they must submit a request for academic leave within 30 days after the opening date of a semester; otherwise, the University will withdraw those students' names from the student registration record.

(4) The University may announce the cancellation of any course or limit the numbers of students registering for any courses in case of reasonable grounds.

Number 15 Course addition after the due stipulated in Number 14 (1) can be completed not later than 30 days after the opening date of a regular semester or within the first 2 weeks after the opening date of a summer semester with permission from an instructor of that course.

Number 16 Course withdrawal shall proceed as follows:

(1) Course withdrawal within the first two weeks after the opening date of a regular semester or within the first week of a summer semester: those withdrawn courses will not be recorded in the transcript.

(2) Course withdrawal after the due date stipulated in Number 1, not later than 12 weeks of a regular semester or not later than 5 weeks of a summer semester: 'W' will be recorded for those withdrawn courses in the transcript.

(3) Course withdrawal in a regular semester: students must have at least one registered course, and if all courses are withdrawn, students must submit a request for academic leave.

Number 17 Course registration, course addition, and course withdrawal apart from the Regulation Number 14 (2), Number 15, and Number 16 (2) can be done with appropriate reasons and permission from a student's advisor and a course instructor, and the Dean shall propose to the President for approval.

Number 18 Tuition fee paid to the University shall be at the rate stipulated in the University Announcement.

Number 19 Course enrollment for learners shall be in accordance with the University Announcement.

Number 20 Transfer of faculties within the University or transfer of majors/programs within the Faculty must have permission from a student's advisor and approval from the Faculty Board to which students intend to transfer, or the Faculty with which students are affiliated.

The criteria and conditions for students who intend to transfer the program in accordance with Clause 1 shall be set by the Board of the Faculty to which students intend to transfer.

Number 21 The University may admit students transferring from other higher institutions through permission from their current institutions and approval from the Board of the Faculty to which students intend to transfer, and from the President. Students shall have studied in their current institute for not less than one regular semester excluding a semester of academic leave or suspension period.

The criteria and conditions to admit transferred students in accordance with Clause 1 shall be set by the Board of the Faculty to which students intend to transfer.

Number 22 Students who are approved to transfer their programs according to Number 20 or Number 21 are eligible to have courses transferred as stipulated in Numbers 23-26.

Number 23 Acceptance of transferred courses and course transfer shall be processed as follows:

(1) Students must submit a request for acceptance of transferred courses or course transfer within two weeks of the study, and the Faculty shall notify the University before the end of the midterm examination of that semester.

(2) Acceptance of transferred courses and course transfer shall be approved by the Faculty Board.

(3) Students who are given approval for transferred courses shall have the same grade or symbol as previously given, and they are not eligible to register for those transferred courses, otherwise those registrations shall be void.

Number 24 Acceptance of transferred courses and course transfer shall be approved by the relevant programs with the following criteria:

(1) A course or module in a curriculum of higher education or the equivalent one must be certified by an authorized government agency.

(2) A course or module must contain contents and learning outcomes with the same level and volume, or at least three-quarters of the contents of the transferred course or module.

(3) A course or module with a grade not below 'C', an equivalent grade, 'G', 'P', or 'S', except for the case in Number 25(2).

(4) The number of transferred courses or modules must not exceed three-quarter of the total credits of the new program.

Number 25 Acceptance of transferred courses and course transfer for students transferring faculties or programs shall be as follows:

(1) The symbol or grade of a transferred course shall be recorded, and the course credits shall be counted as cumulative credits, and shall be calculated for a cumulative grade point.

(2) A transferred course must be the same as a course in the new program, and the grade of that course must be 'D' or above or 'G', 'P', or 'S'.

Number 26 Acceptance of transferred courses and course transfer for transferred students from other higher institutions, those who used to study in other higher institutions, or those who used to study in the University, when they are admitted to study in the University shall be as follows:

(1) The symbol or grade of a transferred course shall be recorded, and the course credits shall be counted as cumulative credits, and shall be calculated for a cumulative grade point average.

(2) The Faculty may count a transferred module which is not specified in the transferred program, and the credits shall be recorded.

Number 27 The equating of knowledge and credits from non-formal and informal education to formal education shall proceed as follows:

(1) Knowledge gained may equate to a course or module offered in the University.

(2) Knowledge gained from work may be considered as equating to a course or module offered in the University.

(3) The assessment for knowledge equating in each course or module, and relevant criteria, shall be as deemed by the program for which students request knowledge equating.

(4) The assessment result shall be not less than 2.00 or its equivalent. A credit of a course or module shall not be counted as an attached point, and shall not be calculated for a cumulative grade point average.

(5) The number of courses or modules to be equated from non-education and informal education must not exceed three-quarter of the total credits of a program, and the students must have enrolled in the University for at least one academic year for graduation.

Number 28 An achievement record, as stipulated in Number 27, shall be recorded according to the following evaluation scheme:

(1) The credits obtained from a standardized test shall be recorded as CS (Credits from standardized test).

(2) The credits obtained from the tests which are not standardized tests shall be recorded as CE (credits from exam).

(3) The credits obtained from educational evaluation or trainings undertaken by other organizations shall be recorded as CT (credits from training).

(4) The credits obtained from the presentation of portfolios shall be recorded as CP (credits from portfolio).

Number 29 Learners are eligible to register for courses or short courses offered by the University based on their interests. Achievements and learning outcomes shall be recorded in the Credit Bank for a lifetime of the student.

Certified learning competency, course registration, tuition fee rate, course transfer, and graduation shall be as deemed by the program management and the University Announcement.

Number 30 A request for a second degree shall proceed as follows:

(1) Students with a bachelor's degree from the University or other higher institutions may request for a study in other bachelor's programs. A request shall be permitted by the Board of the Faculty where students request to study, and shall be approved by the President.

A transferred course shall be in accordance with Numbers 23 and 24. The symbol or grade of a transferred course shall be recorded, and the course credits shall be counted as cumulative credits, and shall be calculated for a cumulative grade point.

(2) A graduate with a bachelor's degree from the University or other higher institutions with a memorandum of academic collaboration on joint program development shall further their study for a second degree as stipulated in the memorandum.

A transferred course shall be in accordance with a memorandum of academic collaboration.

Number 31 Pursuing two degrees shall proceed as follows:

(1) Students may request to pursue two programs in the same period, and if those two programs are at a bachelor's level, graduates shall be awarded two degrees, one from each of the two programs.

(2) Students are eligible to pursue two degrees simultaneously according to academic collaboration between faculties and programs.

Details about pursuing two degrees simultaneously shall be in accordance with the University Announcement.

Section 3

Evaluation and Assessment

Number 32 Evaluation and assessment shall be conducted as follows:

(1) The University evaluates and assesses students and learners for courses registered every semester; this shall be a responsibility of a course instructor or a responsible person assigned by the Faculty to assess learners' development, performance, learning behavior, participation in activities, examinations or other methods as specified in each course of the responsible faculties.

(2) Students and learners who would like to keep credits in the Credit Bank must be evaluated and assessed by all registered courses according to activities assigned by a course instructor and must attend class according to a study plan assigned by a course instructor.

Number 33 Each course shall be evaluated and assessed as follows:

(a) Each credit course shall be evaluated and assessed using 8 letter grades. Each letter grade has its definition and attached point as follows:

Grades	Definitions	Attached Points (per credit)
A	Excellent	4.0
B+	Very good	3.5
B	Good	3.0
C+	Fairly good	2.5
C	Fair	2.0
D+	Poor	1.5
D	Very poor	1.0
E	Fail	0.0

(b) Evaluation and assessment in the forms of letter symbols have the following definitions:

(1) For non-credit courses, e.g., an internship course or a credit course using letter symbols as stipulated in a program, e.g., a cooperative education course or courses stipulated in the regulations and the Faculty or University Announcements, letter symbols are as follows:

G means distinction; good.

P means pass; fairly good.

F means fail.

(2) The letter symbols for non-credit courses are as follows:

S means satisfactory.

U means unsatisfactory.

(3) Other letter symbols are as follows:

I (Incomplete) means incomplete assessment, and shall be used when a course instructor, with the approval of the Curriculum Board or a person in charge of that course, has decided that the evaluation and assessment must be postponed due to students' incomplete assignments considered to be parts of the course. In addition, students can be given 'I' by the Faculty Board as stipulated in 42 (a.) (2) of these Regulations. Students who are given 'I' in any courses shall contact a course instructor in order to carry out the evaluation and assessment within the first week of the following regular semester or the first week of a summer semester. If those students registering for a summer semester fail to carry out the evaluation and assessment within the designated time frame, an 'E', 'F', 'U', 'W', or 'R' shall be indicated in the students' records depending on the relevant circumstances.

W (Withdrawn) means course withdrawal or cancellation, and shall be applied for course withdrawal as stipulated in Number 16 (2) or Number 17, or an approval received for course withdrawal or cancellation as stipulated in Number 42 (a.) (2) of these Regulations. 'W', in addition, shall be given when the Faculty Board approves of students receiving 'I' taking an academic leave in the following semester.

R (Deferred) means postponement of evaluation and assessment until the following regular semester, and shall be applied for a course in which a student is given 'I', and a course is not a theory-practice course, where a course instructor considers that the evaluation and assessment cannot proceed within the first week of the following regular semester, and it is not due to any fault of the student.

'R' shall be given after the approval from the Board of the Faculty responsible for that course, and students given 'R' must re-register for that course in the following regular semester in order to be eligible for being evaluated and assessed. In case students fail to re-register for that course within the first two weeks of the following regular semester, 'E' shall be indicated in the student record.

Number 34 Students given 'E', other designated points by the program, or 'F' for any courses must re-register for those courses except when those are elective courses in a program.

Number 35 Students are not able to re-register for any courses with the attached point of 2.00 or above or 'G', 'P', or 'S' except for courses specified otherwise in the program, any course registration violating this condition shall be void.

Number 36 Students are eligible to register for any courses which are not specific courses of a program as a non-credit course, credits can be accumulated, and the evaluation and assessment shall be 'S' or 'U'.

Students given 'S' or 'U' are not eligible to re-register for that course as a credit-course, except in the case where the students transfer the faculty, field of study, or program, and that course is compulsory for a new program.

Number 37 Cumulative credit computation will accumulate only credits of courses in the curriculum with an attached point of 1.00 or above, or 'G' or 'P'. The attached points can be higher than 1.00 as indicated in the curriculum so that the course credits can be accumulated.

In case students register for a course more than once, the course credits can be accumulated only once, from the last assessment.

Number 38 The University shall assess every student's achievement for courses registered based on the following criteria:

(1) The grade point of a course is the sum of the credit number multiplied by the attached points earned from each course.

(2) The grade point average of a semester is the sum of the grade points of all courses taken in that semester divided by the total number of credits of those courses with grade points.

(3) The cumulative grade point average is the sum of the grade points of all courses taken from the date of initial registration in the University divided by the sum of the credit numbers of the courses with grade points. In cases where students register for a credit course and earn 'D+', 'D' or 'E' more than once, only the latest grade points earned will be used for the computation of the cumulative grade point average.

(4) The grade point average of a semester and the cumulative grade point average are calculated to 2 decimal places without rounding up from the 3rd decimal place.

Number 39 When students' misconduct is found in the evaluation process, e.g., in an examination for any course, the person in charge of the evaluation, or a proctor, reports the misconduct together with evidence of such misconduct to the Faculty with which those students or learners are affiliated, and also to the course instructor. Students or learners who are found to have cheated in the evaluation will be given 'E', 'F', or 'U' for that course.

Number 40 For any other practices in relation to educational examinations not specified in this Regulation, the Faculty shall consider additional announcements as appropriate to the conditions and educational characteristics of each faculty.

Section 4

Academic Status

Number 41 The University shall classify a student's academic status according to a student's grade point average in each semester, excluding semesters of academic leave or suspension period. There are three categories of student status as follows:

(a) "Pass" represents the academic status of students whose grade point average is no less than 2.00.

(b) “Critical” represents the academic status of students whose grade point average is between 1.00 and 1.99 in the first semester of study at the University.

(c) “Probation” represents the academic status of students whose grade point average is less than 2.00, and shall be categorized as follows:

(1) Students studying in the University for the first two semesters who earn a grade point average of 1.25 or above, but lower than 2.00, or students with a ‘pass’ status who earn a grade point average of 1.50 or above, but lower than 2.00 in the following regular semester, will be assigned as “First Probation”.

(2) Students with “First Probation” who earn a grade point average of 1.70 or above, but lower than 2.00, in the following semester, will be assigned as “Second Probation”.

(3) Students with “Second Probation” who earn a grade point average of 1.90 or above, but lower than 2.00 in the following semester, will be assigned as “Third Probation”.

Number 42 Taking leave shall be categorized as follows:

(a) Sick leave or personal leave

(1) Taking leave during a semester shall be as permitted by the student’s advisor and course instructor.

(2) In case of illness or unavoidable circumstances resulting in students not taking the exam, students must request delayed examinations from the course instructor or the course coordinator not more than 7 working days after each examination. A grade of ‘I’ shall be given, or, as a special case, the registration shall be cancelled, and ‘W’ shall be given. The request may be unapproved, in which case the student will be considered absent from the examination.

(3) To take sick leave, students must provide medical certificates from public hospitals every time.

(b) Academic leave means taking leave for the whole semester. Students shall request leave with appropriate reasons and provide related evidence including a consent letter from guardians through a student’s advisor, and the request shall be considered for approval by the Dean. In case students have already registered for courses, those courses in that semester shall not be recorded in their transcript.

In the first academic year at the University, students cannot take academic leave, except for cases of illness, conscription, military service, and/or having received scholarships which the University considers as beneficial to the student.

In case of requesting an exemption other than the aforementioned criteria, a request shall be considered for approval by the President as a special case through the Dean’s proposal.

Students must pay for the fee of maintaining a student status in the semester which is approved for an academic leave or suspension from studying due to disciplinary cause at the rate stipulated by the University.

In case the medical committee appointed by the President diagnoses an ailment, and the Faculty Board agrees that it impedes studying and/or is dangerous to others, the Faculty Board may order a student to take academic leave.

Number 43 A student who wishes to resign from the course, and does not owe any debt to the University, shall submit a resignation form with a consent letter from the student's guardian through the student's advisor for the President's approval.

Number 44 Students who have completed all courses as stipulated in the curriculum, but do not pass competency and/or skills tests, and/or do not pass the requirements of extra-curricular activities, and others as stipulated by programs and/or the University, shall maintain student status and shall pay the fee for maintaining student status.

Number 45 Termination of student or learner status shall proceed as follows:

(a) Termination of student status shall be executed in the following cases:

- (1) Death.
- (2) Resignation.
- (3) Leaving or expulsion on disciplinary grounds.
- (4) Failure to register within 30 days after the opening date of a regular semester without an approval for academic leave or maintaining student status.
- (5) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 1.00 in the first semester of the study at the University.
- (6) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 1.25 in the first two semesters of the study in the University, excluding a semester for academic leave or suspension period.
- (7) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 1.50, except for students registering in the first two semesters at the University.
- (8) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 1.70 in the following semester after the first probation.
- (9) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 1.90 in the following semester after second probation.
- (10) Having a cumulative grade point average less than 2.00 in the following semester after third probation.
- (11) Students who are undergoing accreditation of qualifications and/or accreditation of other qualifications pursuant to the announcement of the curriculum, who do not submit a certificate of qualification or accreditation and/or a certificate of other qualification or accreditation according to the Program Announcement within one academic year after the first day of the study at the University, may submit those certificates in accordance with the Curriculum Announcement right after they receive those aforementioned at the first opportunity.
- (12) The award of the degree is approved.

(b) Termination of learner status shall be executed in the following cases:

- (1) Death.
- (2) Resignation.
- (3) Inappropriate behaviors or any actions causing disgrace to the reputation of the University.

(4) Failure to comply with the rules, regulations, and announcements of the University.

Number 46 Students with expulsion from the University according to Number 45(a)(4) are eligible for reinstatement with consent of the Faculty Board, and shall propose to the President to be considered for approval.

Section 5 Graduation

Number 47 Nomination for degree conferment and approval of degrees shall proceed as follows:

(a) Students who are eligible for degree conferment shall possess the following qualifications:

(1) Completed and passed all the courses and requirements of the program for which students have studied, without “I” or “R”, including equated and transferred courses.

(2) Passed extra-curricular activities for student development stipulated in the University Announcements.

(3) Passed competency and/or skills tests in an accordance with the University Announcements.

(4) Having student status as ‘pass’, with a minimum cumulative grade point average not less than 2.00. Students transferred from other higher institutions must have studied at the University for at least one academic year. The University may additionally announce a grade point of courses for graduation, to be reported to the University Council.

(5) Must not be awaiting punishment for any disciplinary penalties.

(6) Must never have been punished for any disciplinary penalties throughout the study, nor while in self-development or public service projects.

(7) Must not be in a measure for an awaiting punishment period of any disciplinary penalties.

(8) Not owing any debt to the University.

(9) Having applied for degree conferment as stipulated by the University.

(b.) The time period of degree conferment for each program shall be deemed as follows:

(1) For a four-year program, the degree cannot be conferred before 6 regular semesters.

(2) For a five-year program, the degree cannot be conferred before 8 regular semesters.

(3) For a six-year program (at least), the degree cannot be conferred before 10 regular semesters.

(4) For a continuing program, the degree cannot be conferred before 3 regular semesters.

The time period of degree conferment as stipulated in (1), (2), (3), and (4) shall not be applied to students or learners with equated or transferred courses.

(5) A program in the University shall work in line with the professional councils, and shall maintain the academic standards of the program. The University may deem a period of graduation different from (1), (2), (3), and (4), and if so, this is to be reported to the University Council.

(c) Students who are eligible for the University Bachelor's Degree with First Class Honors shall possess the following qualifications:

- (1) Possessing the qualifications stipulated in 47(a) and (b).
- (2) Achieving cumulative grade point average not less than 3.50.
- (3) Having never received attached points less than 2.00, 'F', 'U' or other equivalent grades for any courses.

(4) Having enrolled at the University for the time period of continuous academic years designated in the study plan of a program, including the time the transferred students spent at a former program, faculty, or higher institution, excluding a semester which is approved for an academic leave because of illness, conscription, military service, scholarships, taking courses, or trainings at other higher institutes which the University considers as beneficial to the students.

(5) Having never been punished at the level of suspension from study, including cases awaiting punishment.

(d) Students who are eligible for the University Bachelor's Degree with Second Class Honors shall possess the following qualifications:

(1) Possessing the qualifications stipulated in 47 (a) and (b), 47 (c) (4) and 47 (c) (5).

(2) Achieving cumulative grade point average not less than 3.25, and not being eligible for First Class Honors.

(3) Having never received attached points less than 2.00 for any major courses of a program.

(4) Having never received 'E', 'F', or 'U' for any courses.

(e) Students in continuing programs are not eligible for graduation with honors.

(f) The University will nominate students' names which are eligible to receive a degree or a degree with honors in various programs for approval by the University Council. When the University Council approves to grant a degree in any semester, the registration in the following semester shall be void.

(g) Learners who are eligible for the University Bachelor's Degree shall possess the following qualifications:

(1) Having completed and passed all the courses and course requirements of the program which learners have studied for.

(2) Having passed competency and/or skills tests stipulated in the University Announcements.

(3) Having learner status, with cumulative credits in the Credit Bank as stipulated in programs they have studied for, with a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.00.

(4) Not owing any debt to the University.

(5) Having requested graduation as stipulated by the University.

(6) Having any other required qualifications in accordance with the University Announcements.

Number 48 Degree conferment to students under joint programs between other higher institutions in Thailand or other countries with a memorandum of understanding (MOU) shall proceed as follows:

(1) Degree conferment may be degrees of the University or other higher institutions in Thailand or other countries, joint degrees, or two degrees in accordance to a memorandum of understanding, rules, or regulations on degree conferment of partner institutions.

(2) Other details shall be in accordance with the University Announcements.

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Number 1 These Regulations shall henceforth be known as “Prince of Songkla University Regulations for Undergraduate Studies and Lifelong Education, 2563 B.E. (2020 C.E.)”.

Number 2 These Regulations shall be applied to all students and learners enrolled in Prince of Songkla University from the academic year 2020 on.

Number 3 In these Regulations:

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“Faculty” means faculties, colleges, or other units called otherwise, which are equivalent to the faculties or colleges which offer an undergraduate program.

“Faculty Board” means boards of faculties, colleges, or other units called otherwise, which are equivalent to the faculties or colleges with which students are affiliated.

“Cumulative Credit” means credits which students or learners must earn to complete as stipulated in a study program.

“Credit Bank” means a system for accumulated credits for learners taking courses or short courses offered at the University, and shall include transferred credits in the Credit Bank system.

“Other higher institutions” means public or private institutions of higher education with quality and standards legally established in Thailand or other countries, or by international organizations.

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(4) Not owing any debt to the University.

(5) Having requested graduation as stipulated by the University.

(6) Having any other required qualifications in accordance with the University Announcements.

Number 48 Degree conferment to students under joint programs between other higher institutions in Thailand or other countries with a memorandum of understanding (MOU) shall proceed as follows:

(1) Degree conferment may be degrees of the University or other higher institutions in Thailand or other countries, joint degrees, or two degrees in accordance to a memorandum of understanding, rules, or regulations on degree conferment of partner institutions.

(2) Other details shall be in accordance with the University Announcements.
